A report outlining the impact of the Mottingham Big Local Refocused programme and its role in supporting the local community

## Executive summary

The Mottingham Big Local Refocused (MBLR) programme launched in 2013 and is part of the national Big Local initiative funded through National Lottery. The programme has empowered Mottingham residents to lead transformative change in their community. Over the 12 years of the programme, MBLR has invested £1 million of National Lottery funding into projects and activities that have been shaped by what the local priorities are, with a focus on seven key areas from 2023-2025:

1. Children and young people.
2. Older residents
3. Green spaces
4. Employability
5. Health and wellbeing
6. Ethnic minorities; and
7. Economic empowerment.

Through the delivery of four successive Community Plans, MBLR has been able to provide numerous initiatives, which have reached over 5,600 beneficiaries. Some of the highlights of this work were the Summer of Sports Programme in 2024 and 2025, and the digital skills workshops and the mental health and wellbeing services. The programme has enabled strong partnerships to be formed with local organisations, schools and service providers, ensuring that projects would be sustainable and responsive to community needs.

MBLR's legacy is visible in the Mottingham community; increased social cohesion, and resident-led sustainable local initiatives. The programme's approach, to empower residents to shape and lead activities, has helped to build lasting capacity and resilience, ensuring that Mottingham remains a vibrant, inclusive, and supportive community for years to come.

## 1. Introduction

Mottingham Big Local Refocused (MBLR) began in 2013 as part of the Local Trust Big Local Programme, which placed £1 million of National Lottery funding into the community and empowered the residents to transform their community over a period of 10–15 years. Mottingham was one of 150 areas across England to take part.

Like other Big Local areas, Mottingham's programme has been entirely resident led. MBLR's board of residents has remained committed to long-term change, putting the community in control of its future. At the start of the programme, MBLR formed a partnership of residents, local businesses and stakeholders dedicated to making Mottingham a better place to live and work. Throughout the programme, MBLR consistently consulted with residents across the area to understand what mattered most to them.

Mottingham is a friendly and vibrant, welcoming community, where residents are proud of where they live and look out for each other. Mottingham is not an affluent part of the borough of Bromley, but what it lacks financially, is made up for by the abundant sense of community; the welcoming residents and feeling of togetherness is unmatched.

The catchment area in Mottingham was selected as it was an area of deprivation that had received no previous funding. The aim of the funding was to improve the community, through a range of initiatives, activities, events and projects, which targeted specific areas of need. The MBLR core aims have remained consistent across all four of their Community Plans. The two Community Plans that spanned 2017-2023 targeted areas of need, which focused on ‘economy’; ‘infrastructure’; ‘people’ and ‘place’.

MBLR’s final plan from 2024-2026, focused on seven specific areas of need:

1. Children and young people
2. Green spaces
3. Older residents
4. Employability
5. Health and wellbeing
6. Ethnic minorities
7. Economic empowerment

## 2. Catchment area, partnership board & timeline

### 2.1 Catchment area

MBLR’s catchment area stretches from Dunkerry Road, across to Mottingham Recreation Ground, and as far as the border of Elmstead Lane. The area contains two large housing estates.



## 2.2 Board of residents

MBLR's board of residents, local stakeholders and advisors has remained committed to long-term change, putting the community in control of its future and how the funds were spent. Throughout the programme, there has been increased participation from residents engaging in and attending events, projects and activities. We regularly

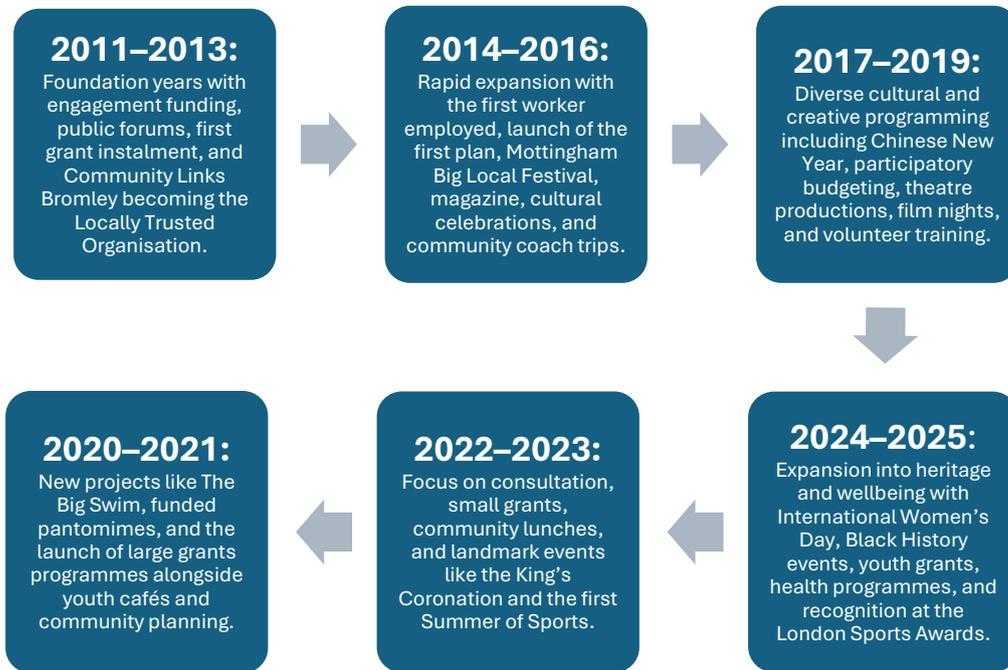

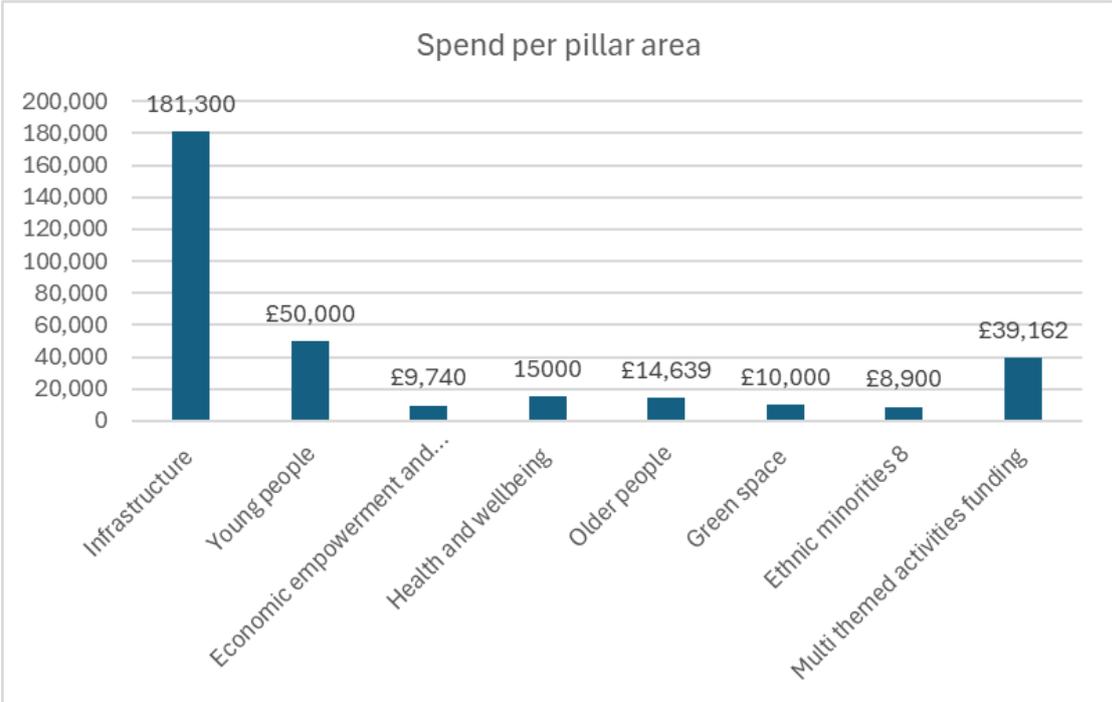

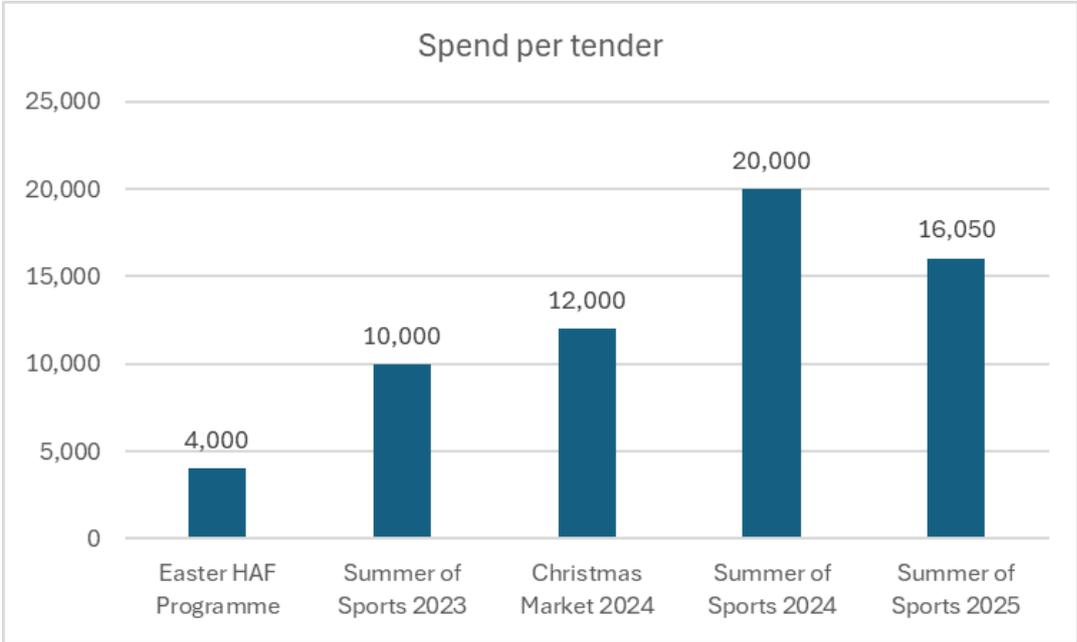

### 3. Financial overview



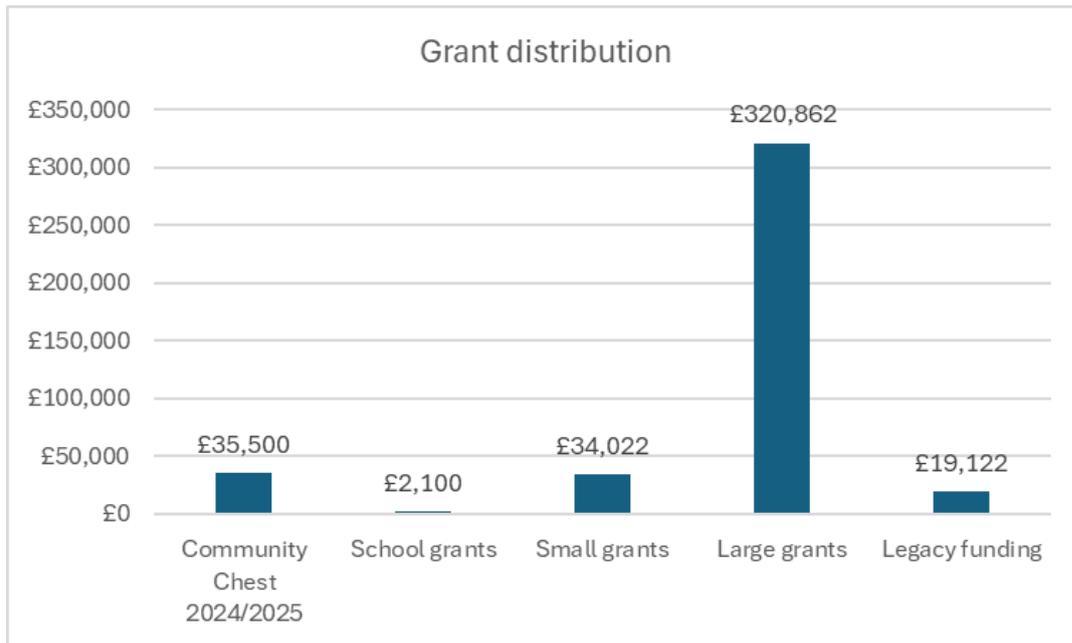

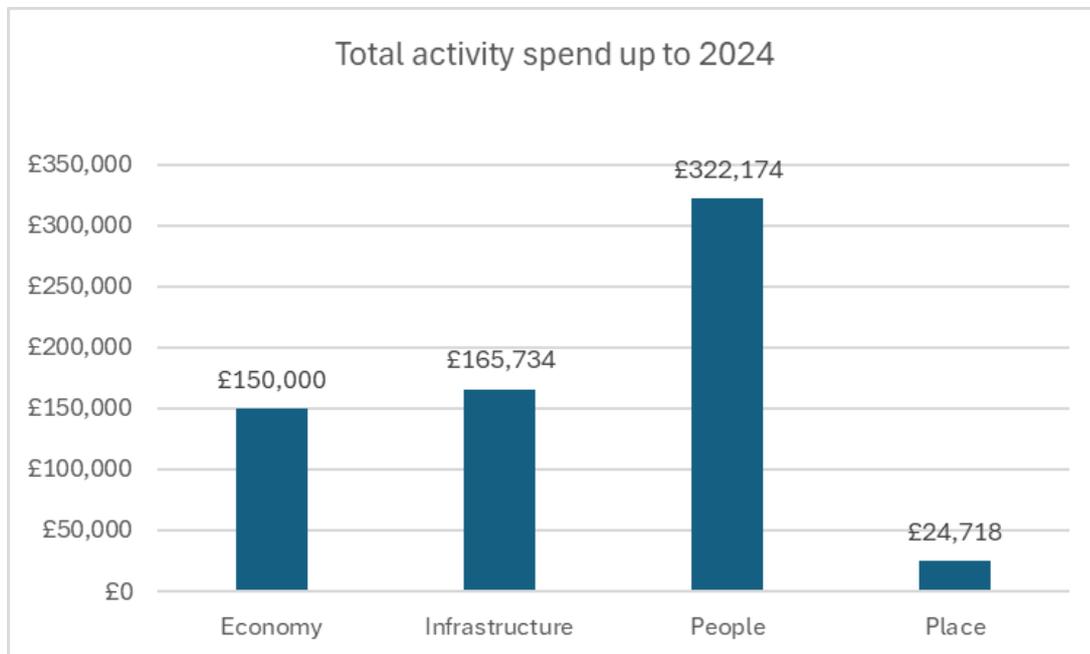
The table above demonstrates the spend per tender.

## 4. Key pillars and achievements

### 4.1 Children and young people



The Summer of Sports Programme, first launched in 2023, provided a wide range of activities for children during the school holidays. The programme was run in conjunction with Bromley Youth Service in 2023 and 2024, and Bromley Football Club Community Trust in 2025. Young people enjoyed cycling tours of the Kent Coast, football, netball, canoeing, non-contact boxing and martial arts training, amongst many other activities.

As well as the successful Summer of Sports Programme, MBLR also funded a number of other projects for young people through small grants. These ranged from gaining valuable life skills, through swimming lessons, to counselling and fun activities such as games clubs and trips to the panto. A full list of MBLR-funded activities is listed below.

#### **Community Chest youth activities**

- A Detach service (a mobile youth centre) for young people – provided by Bromley Youth Services.
- School uniform support – provided by Bromley Brighter Beginnings.

- Creativity and songwriting workshops – provided by The Art Train Project with MyTime Active.
- LEGO and games clubs – provided by Infinity Martial Arts.
- Junior martial arts training – provided by Infinity Martial Arts.

#### **Large grant youth activities**

- Art therapy and arts and crafts sessions for pupils at St Vincents School, Elmstead Woods School, and Ravensworth Primary School – provided by the Gerald Moore Gallery.
- Youth café – provided by StEP

#### **Small grant youth activities**

Counselling – provided by the Marion Dolly Foundation and StEP.

#### **Non-grant youth activities**

- Children’s swimming lessons – provided by Eric Liddel Leisure Centre.
- Trips to the panto – provided by MBLR

Children and young people were also at the forefront of the Large Grants Programme.

#### **Play n Stay (STEP)**

This was a successful project, consistently oversubscribed! Parents, carers and children alike loved it and looked forward to it, enjoying a range of activities for all ages in a relaxed, welcoming and friendly environment and many new friendships were made. There was opportunity for a range of support from the dedicated and experienced staff, and no one was excluded creating a diverse group learning from each other.

## 5.2 Older people



The MBLR programme made a lasting impact on the lives of older residents in Mottingham through events and activities that fostered connection and inclusion. From hearty meals to festive outings, MBLR’s work exemplified how we met both the emotional and social needs of older residents.

Community lunches and brunches were a cornerstone of MBLR’s outreach. These gatherings—featuring traditional food like pie and mash, fish and chips as well as Caribbean, Indian and Italian cuisine and Christmas dinners—the meals offered more than just food. Live entertainment was provided by our resident singer Tracy and Quizmaster Terry Millen. They created a warm, welcoming space where older residents could share stories, laughter, and companionship. These events helped combat social isolation and strengthened community bonds. In addition, attendees were able to seek information and advice from a range of local stakeholders including Citizens Advice Bromley, NHS Southeast London and Bromley Well.

Supported by MBLR grants, StEP provided weekly breakfasts and brunches for senior citizens as well as their legendary Afternoon Tea.

The seasonal coach trips were especially popular with senior citizens, and we went to various coastal destinations as well as Rochester Christmas Market and Dartford Theatre.

In Autumn of this year, we launched a pilot Games and Social club, activities included Darts, Puzzles, Board Games, Card, Dominoes, Chess and Draughts. Such was the popularity of the club the funding was extended to the end of 2025.

### 5.3 Economic empowerment and employability

The programme has addressed promoting employability and economic empowerment across the MBLR community, offering tailored support to residents of all ages and backgrounds.

- For older residents, the Digital Confidence Workshops have helped bridge the technology gap, equipping participants with essential digital skills to navigate online services and connect with others.
- MBLR partnered with Citizens Advice Bromley to deliver weekly information, advice, and guidance sessions. These sessions took place at Mottingham Community Centre which made them easily accessible for residents. The sessions ensured residents had access to expert support on employment, benefits, finances, housing, and financial wellbeing.
- Young people benefited from a wide range of employability initiatives, including driving test training, CV-building workshops, and leadership development courses—all designed to boost confidence, readiness, and long-term career prospects.
- Both STEP and St Edwards Church via their large grants, also ran professional development courses for residents, focusing on workplace skills, training and mentoring, personal growth, and pathways to sustainable employment.
- At St Edwards food grown at the community garden was given out the foodbank.
- Donated over 100 scientific calculator sets to all Year 6 students at the three schools in the MBLR catchment area

Throughout the programme, we have provided multiple health and wellbeing of accessible initiatives. At the heart of these efforts was a commitment to mental health support, exemplified by the provision of free counselling services tailored to both young people and adults. This vital resource offered a safe and confidential space for individuals to navigate personal challenges and build emotional resilience.

The Art Therapy sessions Gerald Moore Gallery facilitated, supported primary school children over a three-year period, with their emotional wellbeing through art therapy using the gallery's exhibitions and collections as a

stimulus for therapy. They also supported teachers through wellbeing activities and CPD events.

Magpie Dance the UK's leading dance charity for people with learning disabilities brought their project to Mottingham. They firmly believe that a learning disability should not be a barrier to personal and artistic success. Through dance, participants gained, social and communication skills with added health and wellbeing benefits.

As part of our grants programme STEP provided a free counselling service to residents, the sessions were not restricted allowing beneficiaries to receive support if they needed it. Mary Dolly Foundation also provided specialist counselling to families that were victims of domestic abuse. Both services enabled residents to receive transformative unrestricted specialist support.

Complementing this, a comprehensive Health and Wellbeing programme was commissioned in March of this year offering a diverse range of free activities designed to nurture both physical and mental wellbeing. These included:

- Tai Chi, Yoga, and Pilates sessions to promote flexibility, mindfulness, and core strength
- Vital 5 health checks to encourage proactive management of key health indicators
- Stress management workshops providing practical tools for coping with daily pressures
- Arts and crafts workshops fostering creativity and social connection
- Drama-based wellbeing sessions exploring emotional expression and self-confidence
- Nature walks and foraging events to reconnect participants with the outdoors and promote environmental awareness

## 5.5 Serving a diverse community



The programme has made meaningful strides in celebrating diversity and empowering ethnic minority groups through a range of culturally enriching and development-focused initiatives:

- Windrush Community Lunch (2025): Honoured the legacy of the Windrush generation, the event had several inspirational speaker and traditional Caribbean Steel Pan music
- Black History Month Celebration (2024): Showcased Black heritage through music, artwork, spoken word and delicious locally sourced Caribbean food, promoting cultural awareness and unity.
- Chinese New Year Celebration: Brought the community together to experience traditional Chinese New Year celebrations.
- Indian-Themed Community Lunch: Celebrated Indian culture through food, and conversation.
- Leadership & Development Training for underrepresented males: Provided targeted support to enhance leadership skills, boost confidence, and improve career prospects for underrepresented groups

## 5.6 Green space



Whilst Bromley is surrounded by green space, only 4% of the MBLR catchment area is designated green space (compared to 14% for London Generally).

- Through direct support for the St Edwards community gardens and other green areas within the catchment zone, we've helped maintain vibrant, accessible spaces for residents to enjoy nature.
- Our wellness initiatives—Wild and Free and Wild and Pure—have brought people closer to the outdoors through guided nature walks and local foraging events, encouraging ecological awareness. In partnership with Good Gym, residents and local organizations received hands-on help with gardening projects, strengthening community ties while improving shared spaces.
- In summer 2024, we hosted two unforgettable Community Park Days at Foxes Field, drawing over 500 residents and welcoming the Mayor of Bromley. These events transformed the park into a hub of activity, with multi-sport sessions and arts and crafts that celebrated local families coming together/

## 7. Legacy and impact

Mottingham Big Local Refocused (MBLR) programme has delivered a wide-ranging and deeply felt impact across the Mottingham community. Through targeted funding and grassroots engagement, MBLR has supported initiatives that promote wellbeing, education, safety, and community cohesion. This section highlights key outcomes and legacy achievements. It has left a legacy across the community, empowering residents, enriching local spaces, and nurturing new opportunities for residents.

### 7.1 Community spaces and visual legacy



MBLR has left a visible mark on Mottingham, beginning with a striking mural at the local Mottingham Coop that celebrates local identity and collective pride. To ensure the programme's story is preserved, a legacy film was produced, capturing the voices and experiences of those who benefited from its support. The programme

also played a pivotal role in enhancing local green spaces, with large grant funding contributing significantly to the development of St Edwards Community Garden. Further improvements were made at Ravensworth and St Vincents, where pupils now enjoy a newly installed library and a tranquil prayer garden, respectively. In addition, MBLR's Community Chest funding helped develop the Mottingham Sports Ground Playground at Grove Park Road (SE9 4NP) into a safer, more inclusive environment for children and families.

## 7.2 Health, fitness, and safety



MBLR funding has empowered residents to lead healthier and more active lives. A weekly soft play class for toddlers was launched within the catchment area, providing young children with a safe and engaging space to play—an initiative that will continue beyond the programme’s conclusion. Swimming lessons funded by MBLR enabled 24 children and 6 adults to learn to swim. Martial arts were also a focus, with 20 children earning their judo white belts and Infinity Martial Arts introducing a female-only self-defence class that helped 10 women learn basic martial arts techniques. In total, 20 juniors achieved white belt status through Infinity Martial Arts, fostering confidence and discipline. To further support community safety, 12 residents completed Level 3 Paediatric First Aid training, equipping them with essential emergency response skills.

### 7.3 Sustained local initiatives

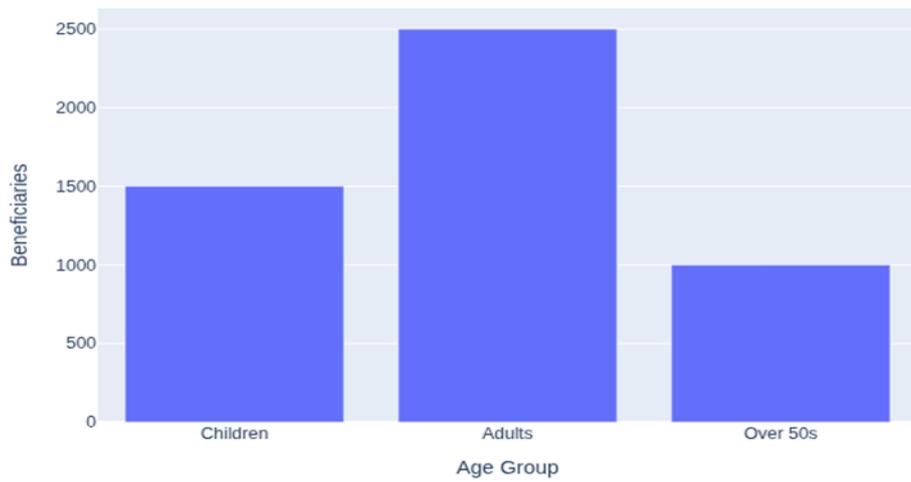


The legacy of MBLR extends beyond its funding period, with several projects securing continued support. Potential Me, The Three C's, and Health and Wellbeing Through Drama—all recipients of MBLR grants—have obtained funding to carry on their work in Mottingham, ensuring ongoing access to personal development, creative expression, and wellbeing services. One of the programmes pilot initiatives, a community games club, proved so

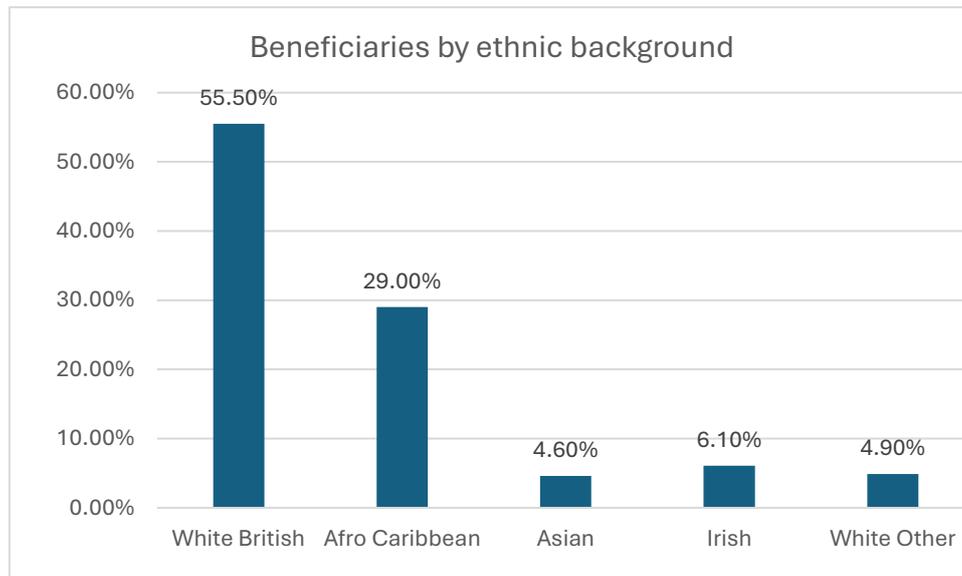
successful that residents have taken ownership and now host a weekly Friday evening session. This grassroots continuation exemplifies the lasting impact of MBLR in fostering community-led activities and strengthening local bonds.

## 8. Testimonials and case studies

### Case study 1: Young People

Local resident, aged 14, joined the Summer of Sports programme in 2023. Through football and boxing sessions, he gained confidence, improved his health, and made new friends.

### Case Study 2: Older residents and digital skills

**Debbie:** Debbie's journey was defined by a strong focus on online safety. She participated well in the group and made conscious decisions to only perform certain sensitive tasks on her laptop, demonstrating a keen understanding of security best practices. Her cautious, yet proactive approach to managing personal information underscores the importance of a mindful approach to digital security.

**Peter:** Acknowledging his learning disability, Peter was a model of honesty and determination. While some complex tasks were challenging, he consistently attended sessions and participated fully in group activities. His presence and active listening highlight that success is not just about mastering every skill, but about the courage to show up and engage with the learning process.

### Case Study 3: Local Business Support 1

**Infinity Martial Arts** received a Community Chest grant to deliver free martial arts training for juniors and a female only class. The female only class continues to flourish and is now a permanent fixture of their schedule.

### Case Study 3: Local Business Support 2

At all MBLR events we always strived to use local suppliers and source Mottingham based businesses. At fetes, fairs and community meal we have regularly hired local providers such as Trawlers fish and Chips, Arawak Caribbean catering, Marlborough Bakery, Mottingham Coop and Dil Tandoori, Lollipop Events to name a few.
