COVID-19

7am, Weds 2 Dec:

Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is approved for use by the MHRA

8am, Tues 8th Dec:

First south east London patient gets vaccinated at Guy's, accompanied by the Prime Minister

Tues 8th – Sat 12th Dec:

South East London's three hospital sites at Guy's, Denmark Hill and PRUH successfully administer 975 doses of vaccine each – with no vaccine wasted for want of patients, space or staff

Monday 14 Dec:

Lambeth Covid-19 vaccination centre at the Hurley Clinic becomes the first in London to administer the vaccine outside of a hospital setting








How our south east London population is receiving the vaccine

1. At hospital sites, delivered by NHS Trusts

- Over 80s, care home staff and frontline health workers
- Opening in two stages in SEL
- 1. Denmark Hill, PRUH, Guy's went live 8 Dec
- Lewisham Hospital, QEH, QMH, St Thomas' go live dates TBC based on vaccine supply, but likely to be January



Progress:

- √ 975 doses given on time at each of the three sites
- ✓ Targeting age 80+ inpatients where clinically appropriate and outpatients due to be on site.
- ✓ All large care homes have been contacted by GSTT and KCH to offer vaccination to their staff
- ✓ Second batches of 975 doses received Monday 14 Dec
- ✓ Lists of clinically vulnerable staff to ensure there is no wastage if over 80s and care home staff come forward for vaccination in limited numbers
- ✓ GSTT and KCH actively sharing learning from their week one experiences with primary care colleagues in SEL and across London



How our south east London population is receiving the vaccine

2. In general practice, delivered by Primary Care Networks (PCNs)

- Groups of general practices working together in local neighbourhoods
- Focus initially on over 80s and will then expand to include other older people, moving down the age groups, and people who are 'at risk' due to their medical conditions
- PCNs are likely to cover care home residents once there is sufficient vaccine that can be transported into care homes

Progress:

- ✓ The first six PCNs in south east London (one per SEL borough) started vaccinating from Mon 14 Dec
- ✓ Subsequent 'waves' of PCN sites will open on 17/18 Dec (wave 2), then 21 Dec (wave 3), and then late Dec/early Jan (wave 4)
- ✓ We will work with PCNs, likely through local 'enhanced care to care homes' providers, to contact smaller care homes and offer staff vaccination
- ✓ Some general practice and community based staff will be on standby for vaccination to avoid wastage at the end of the five day expiry window, should over 80s not come forward in sufficient numbers to deliver the 975 doses in time



How our south east London population will receive the vaccine

3. At mass vaccination centres

- One site for South East London initially, increasing to one per borough, with additional centres being stood up if there is demand outside of the hospital and PCN sites
- Will focus on large numbers of the 'rest of the population', likely from January
- These sites have been identified and secured, ready to be fitted out with equipment and IT, and staffed when we have future vaccine supply confirmed



How our south east London population will receive the vaccine





4. At community pharmacies

- Small number of sites that meet stringent criteria, including 8am-8pm opening, seven days a week, and premises fit for social distancing and smooth flow of large numbers of patients (200+ per day)
- Further information to be published on 18 Dec, with a view to pharmacies delivering Covid vaccine from January

5. Through 'roving' services that will vaccinate housebound people and those who cannot travel to one of the other delivery sites

We await further information on timescales for this model to be developed, as it is highly likely that we will need a second vaccine to be approved that does not require such stringent storage and transport conditions as the Pfizer vaccine



Our next steps to January


- Supporting all 35 SEL PCNs to go live and deliver 975 doses a week with minimal wastage
- External factors will be critical for the phasing of additional sites becoming live (additional hospital, pharmacies, mass vaccs, roving), including:
 - The rate of vaccine supply
 - The approval of a second vaccine (Oxford/AstraZeneca?)
 - Confirmation of when we will be able to start inviting over 75s and work through the subsequent priority cohorts
- Proactive planning now for care home residents based on what we can expect from a second vaccine and using our Enhanced Health in Care Homes arrangements
- Ongoing monitoring of uptake and proactive communications to support equal access and confidence to uptake vaccination across SEL populations

- Older people's care homes residents and staff
 - 2. People 80 years of age and over, and healthcare and social care workers
 - 3. People 75 years of age and over
 - 4. People 70 years of age and over
 - 5. People 65 years of age and over
- 6. Adults under 65 years of age at high risk due to medical conditions
- 7. Adults under 65 years of age at moderate risk due to medical conditions
 - 8. People 60 years of age and over
 - 9. People 55 years of age and over
 - 10. People 50 years of age and over
- 11. Key workers, and the rest of the population

Key messages for the public 1 why vaccination is important



- After clean water, vaccination is the most effective public health intervention, saving lives and protecting the most vulnerable in our society
- The NHS is facing the greatest global health threat in its history the coronavirus pandemic - and cases are rising again
- Getting the COVID-19 vaccination as soon as you are called should protect you and may help to protect your family and those you care for. The COVID-19 vaccine should help reduce the rates of serious illness and save lives and will also reduce pressure on the NHS and social care services





Key messages for the public 2



- Progress on developing the vaccine has been rapid and the arrival of a vaccine is exciting, giving hope that we can beat the virus over time
- The approved vaccine is safe and effective for the vast majority of people – it has been tested on thousands of people and assessed by experts
- Other vaccines in development will only be available on the NHS once they have been thoroughly tested to make sure they are safe and effective
- The Covid-19 vaccine is being offered free of charge to people most at risk from coronavirus first
- It will be offered more widely as soon as possible



The #CovidVaccine has undergone rigorous tests that are globally recognised as having the highest safety standard.







